What is Title I?

Lincoln County High School is identified as a Title I school as part of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). Title I is designed to support State and local school reform efforts tied to challenging state academic standards in reinforce and enhance efforts to improve teaching and learning for students. Title I programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support

parental involvement. All Title I schools must jointly develop with all parents a written parental involvement policy.



School Plan for Shared Student Achievement

What is it?

This is a plan that describes how Lincoln County High School will provide opportunities to improve parent engagement to support student learning. Lincoln County High School values the contributions and involvement of parents to establish an equal partnership for the common goal of improving student achievement. This plan describes the different ways that Lincoln County High School will support parent engagement and how parents can help plan and participate in activities and events to promote student learning at school and at home.



How is it revised?

Lincoln County High School invited parents to attend a meeting to review and revise this parental involvement policy, as well as the schoolwide plan, our school-parent compact. Additionally, parent input and comments regarding this plan are welcome during the school year through an online form. The plan is posted on our school web site for parents to view and submit feedback throughout the year. All parent feedback received during the year will be used to revise the plan for the next school year. We also distribute an annual survey online and by mail to ask parents for their suggestions on the plan and the use of funds for parental involvement. Parents can also give feedback during several parent meetings and activities during the school year.

Who is it for?

All students participating in the Title I, Part A program, and their families, are encouraged and invited to fully participate in the opportunities described in this plan. Lincoln County High School will provide full opportunity for the participation of parents with limited English, parents with disabilities and parents of migratory children.

Where is it available?

At the beginning of the year, the plan is included in the student handbook that is given to all students. The plan will also be posted on the school web site. Parents can request a copy of the plan in the front office.

2018-2019 District Goals

All schools in the district will improve their ELA proficient and distinguished scores on the EOG/EOC in the spring.

LCHS School Improvement Goals

- The percentage of students scoring a 2 or higher on the writing prompts on the 9th grade Literature and American Literature EOC.
- The percentage of students with low growth will decrease by 3% each year as measured by each EOC tests.
- The percentage of students scoring proficient/distinguished will increase by 1.5% each year as measured by the Math EOC tests.

School-Parent Compacts

As part of this plan, Oak Elementary and our families will develop a school-parent compact, which is an agreement that parents, teachers, and students will develop that explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all our students reach grade-level standards. The compacts will be reviewed and updated annually based on feedback from parents, students and teachers during the Community Cares event and the School Forum. The school-parent compacts are kept with each child's teacher if parents need a copy.

A forum for parents to get information about the course offerings for the upcoming school year.


College and Career Fair – February 21, 2019

Parental Involvement

- ✓ Work with our parents to develop relevant trainings and helpful presentations to educate our staff on the importance of parental involvement.
- ✓ Provide necessary materials and handouts for parents at conferences, meetings, and activities to help parents work with their child to improve their child's achievement.
- ✓ Use our Partners in Education and School-Community Team to improve awareness of the activities and events listed in the school parental involvement policy.
- ✓ Offer literacy and computer classes for parents to help further enhance their various educational levels.
- ✓ Collect feedback from parents at all events, place input card around the building and post suggestion form on the school website in order to respond to parents' requests for additional support for parental involvement activities.
